THE LAST THREE MONTHS from the end of the summer season have been busy with several projects that will enhance the Club infrastructure and our service to our members.

After researching other major yacht and sporting clubs' management systems, the implementation of a new club-wide software, NorthStar, has proceeded smoothly. It has taken a lot of time and commitment from our staff and leadership teams to come up to speed with the capabilities of the new system. I sincerely thank all staff for making space in their schedules to attend training meetings. Our old system that is being replaced, whilst working, was aged, disparate and very complex when interrogating data from the Club's 26 different softwares that required multiple different logins by staff. The Northstar system went 'live' on the May 1st. Out of those 26 original softwares this leaves only 3 as necessary stand-alones. Benefits from this system are increased efficiency of data and time, security and major benefits to staff efficiency in operating across the whole of the club data and thus delivering better data to committees and

to the CEO for our decision-making process.

A capital works project that has been on the Club's 'to do list' since 2010 is the repair of the Campbell Deck and refurbishment of the Athol Hobbs Room. This room is probably the Club's most overlooked and underused asset. The essential repairs to the Campbell Deck outside the room have, over the past few years, been less in scope than the necessary full renovation because of priorities being elsewhere. We now have an opportunity to address the whole situation fully and incorporate renovations to the Athol Hobbs room that will create a much more member and guest friendly environment. This renovation and refurbishment project will deliver an efficient and desirable income-producing function space including aged or disability access via a lift, a ladies' bathroom and a UAT, modern décor with weather buffering to outdoor areas, practicable serving of food from the

kitchen below via the lift, updated bar and refrigeration and expansive Swan River views from panoramic windows. This is subject to final tender costings and budgets but if acted upon will provide the signature facility of the Club with a view over the grounds to the river that is unequalled.

The Marina and Site Masterplan group is looking at whole-of-precinct projects and directions that aim to benefit the Club in the future. These include improved pedestrian and vehicular access into the Club, increased parking availability, rationalisation of hardstand and marina berths, sustainable power supply and refurbishment of the slipway amenity.

As a response to updated Work Health and Safety Laws our Risk and Assurance group is currently reviewing the Club's position on exposure to risk and its management. Operational, financial and reputational risk are currently the focus but other considerations such as external risks and compliance are also included. The ambition is to update all policies and registers as soon as possible and continue our registration of any risks when identified.

I thank all staff and Committees for their great work during the Club year and commend them for the positive changes made to date and those that are still being progressed.

ST AYLES SKIFFS SATURDAY 17 JUNE 2023



ST AYLES SKIFFS YOU WANT ME TO ROW ALL THE WAY TO GUILDFORD?



WHAT COULD POSSIBLY GO WRONG with a plan to have 25 Freshie members row to Guildford and back in the middle of June? mmmm...let me see... WEATHER: Ten days out the Saturday was forecast with violent thunderstorms. RIVER IN FLOOD: Record rain over June, possibly all surging down the river. What the hell...let's do it!

Two of our lovely Saint Ayles Skiffs (SAS), *Dotsie* and *Shadow*, were towed by RIBs to a beach by the Narrows on Saturday, June 17. The row from there to Guildford was in four stages, with crew changes at Claisebrook, Tranby and the Ascot Kayak Club. Coffee and munchies were available at each changeover spot to provide sustenance to weary muscles. As it turned out the weather was wonderful on both days and the heavy rains had, for the most part, not made it yet into the river system.

Your scribe had put together various snippets of history and points of interest for the coxswains to read out as we gracefully slid by various landmarks. Alas, the chatter on each skiff usually drowned out the cox's dulcet tones. There is something about the SAS that attracts a splendid group of people, and the assembled 25 on this excursion were certainly testimony to that!

On arrival at Guildford, we left the boats at the Grammar boatshed overnight and decamped to the Rose and Crown hotel. As the oldest operating hotel in WA, it took us back to a wilder time in the colony's history. There is a historic 200m tunnel to the river to bring grog...it was too dangerous to transport it in plain sight!

Dinner and drinks were served in the cellar below the Rose and Crown. With barely 2 metres of 'freeboard' John Longley had to duck as he wandered around networking. Charles Colvin gave a splendid rendition of Banjo Paterson's 'A Bush Christening' in memory of our recently passed John Walsh who was so involved in the SAS phenomenon. The great acoustics amplified a rousing rendition of the Catalpa song honouring the brazen escape of the 6 Fenians in 1876, initially in a rowboat not much longer than our SAS skiffs.

Sunday morning saw us in the hands of Gay Sweeney from the Guildford Historical Society who led us around historic Guildford imparting many snippets about this earliest of European settlement in WA. She stressed the major river traffic from Guildford to the coast in the 1850's. There are still plenty of examples of architecture from this early period, but one recent addition is a stunning statue of a WW1 soldier astride his horse.

Time for the return trip and we glided back down the river helped by about half a knot of current. At Claisebrook we hitched the boats to RIBs and towed them back to Freshie after rowing about 40km. Another great weekend of rowing!

from the Mediterranean to Singapore

Androdute SALING THE INDIANO EAN WITH KAY OTTEE AO

he GFC did offer opportunities: for example the fire sale of boats in Spain. One day my boss, who owns a JPK FC 38 ft racing yacht, calls me from Germany: 'Bernard, I saw this beautiful red yacht in the marina of Palma in Majorca. She is for sale. Why don't you go and look at her?' A few phone calls later I understood that the owner, Martin Varsavski, had been gently asked by his banks to come up with cash quickly. Leverage can be your friend or your enemy. Martin is a serial entrepreneur, 'young, rich and restless' according to Forbes. And to make a long and complicated story short, after an inspection in Gibraltar, I end up the owner of the 92ft *Aphrodite* built in 1993 by Vitters shipyard (www.vitters.com). She is designed by Andre Hoek (www.hoekdesign.com) —these two names make for a serious pedigree—but the real inspiration are the famous Olin Stephens' ketches like *Kialoa III, Sayula* winner of the first Whitbread, *Eb Tide, Cyclos II, Victoria of Strathearn,* etc. The Nautor Swan 82ft ketch by S&S shows similar deck layout, rig and hull lines.

live in Singapore so next came the issue of bringing the boat to Asia. Transport by cargo being outrageously expensive, I contacted a friend who delivers boats. Simon tells me no problem: we sail from the Mediterranean through the Red Sea and then on to the Maldives and Phuket in Thailand. A trip of 6200nm or six to eight weeks. At the

time piracy from Somalia was making this passage very dangerous. Simon tells me he will call his ex-SAS friends to join the delivery. The plan was to buy Kalashnikovs in Egypt and to scare the Somali pirates away.

My insurance company did not like the idea and told me to hire a specialised accredited security team, the cost of which was very high at the time.

The alternative was to sail the classic route from the Mediterranean to Cape Town, then to go to 38–40 degrees south to catch the strong westerlies.

This is called the Brouwer Route, discovered by a captain of the VOC (United Dutch East India Company) on one of the trips to Batavia from Holland to get spices from the Indonesian islands of the Banda Sea and Halmahera. The Dutch were selling them at huge profits in Europe. Traditionally, ships stopped in Cape Town and sailed north after the Cape of Good Hope, with variable winds and slow passages.

Captain Henrik Brouwer in 1610 got into a storm in the South Atlantic



Ocean and the winds pushed him to 40–45 degrees south. He encountered the strong westerly winds of the Roaring Forties. After his stop in Cape Town, he decided to go south again because he figured out that he would find the same westerly winds in the Indian Ocean (the location of the West Australian coast, discovered by Dirk Hartog in 1616, was not known to Europeans at that time). The new route halved the time to reach Batavia. Henrik Brouwer's ships sailed where no ship had sailed before. Just imagine that. I am sure they kept 'a good lookout at all times'!

A phrodite was berthed in the Burriana marina North of Valencia, next to the Whitbread yacht *Merit*. Through a chance







contact, we were able to buy second hand gear from the Volvo 70 *Pirates of the Caribbean*, including sails with large skulls! The trip to the supermarket the week before was truly epic and included several Spanish hams at EUR40 each. Food for seven crew for eight weeks!


Aphrodite left for the long voyage on 15 October 2013, with Simon and a crew of six Australians and British sailors. One member of the crew was a young and fit Australian soldier who was taking a long service leave after 10 years with the SAS including several tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan. He had never sailed before but was a quick learner. He was very fit!

The start of the voyage was not easy as Aphrodite encountered strong Southerly winds when entering the Atlantic Ocean, breaking most of the Wedgwood bone china tableware service when a cupboard door opened. This was not the first time Wedgwood china travelled by sail to Asia: In 1792, the English monarch George III sent an Embassy headed by Earl Macartney of Lissanore to China in an attempt to negotiate a preferential treaty of commerce and friendship with the Qianlong Emperor. One of the gifts to the emperor was Wedgwood china.

More favourable winds followed and *Aphrodite* sailed as close as 200nm from the eastern point of Brazil before veering SE to reach Cape Town on 3 December. A seven week non-stop trip of 6900nm across the

Canary Islands, close to the Cape Verde Islands, almost touching Brazil and through the doldrums or horse latitudes.

n Cape Town, only three crew stayed on the boat and four new crew from Australia joined *Aphrodite*, including our celebrated Kay Cottee AO. Kay Cottee AO (née McLaren, born 25 January 1954) is the first woman to sail a single-handed, non-stop and unassisted circumnavigation of the world. She performed this feat in 1988 in her 37ft (11m) yacht *Blackmores First Lady*, taking 189 days. Since 1988 she hadn't done much long distance sailing.

The North Sails loft of Cape Town took care of sail repairs and the galley was restocked with excellent and cheap South African wines. Two weeks after arrival, *Aphrodite* left Cape Town and sailed to 38–40 degrees South.

Favourable Westerly winds, and an Indian Ocean with surprisingly little wave height made for a much easier trip. On one run, the sheets were not touched for 2,000nm. The trip to Bali of 5800nm was done in a respectable 28 days or an average speed of more than 8 knots. Maximum wind was 45kn and *Aphrodite* regularly reached speeds of 14kn. Days on end albatrosses were following *Aphrodite*, soaring up and down with only slight changes of their wings. Their heart beat is the same as when they are on land.

Aphrodite did not have any major gear or mechanical issues, a testament to the quality of her build. She sailed with a fairly small 100% genoa, a staysail and in-mast furled main and mizzen sail, an asymmetrical spinnaker and a mizzen asymmetrical. Because of the small genoa, she needed 12kn of wind to get going. I now have an 135% genoa, and she sails in 8kn winds with decent speed.

After the end of the voyage in Lombok, our young soldier decided not to return to the army and started a Mine Rescue Course in Perth. My wife and I met his new local girlfriend for dinner at Steve's in Nedlands. He later told us that he proposed to her by giving her an iron ore sample. He is now married into West Australian mining royalty. They have two young daughters and live in a penthouse on Bondi Beach.

A phrodite has been used on family trips in Lombok, the Anambas archipelago and Phuket. My 84 year old mother joined a week cruise in Phang Nga Bay in Phuket. She—the boat, not my mother—has done several seasons of charter in the Mergui archipelago with Burma Boating (www.burmaboating.com). Covid-19 forced her to stay in harbour for almost three years; that was very painful. On the cards is exploring further east in Indonesia: Komodo, the Banda sea and Raja Ampat in particular.

Aphrodite will participate in the Phuket Kings Cup this year with several members of RFBYC on the crew. She has a new set of Doyle sails in Contender Fibercon Pro-Hybrid – a woven Dacron with 30% dyneema fibers. The previous set of sails has lasted 15 years and were a bit tired. Previously when my skipper told me that we needed new sails I told him that if they still have three sides they are fine.

Aphrodite is now offering charters in the Anambas archipelago located 155nm NE of Singapore from May to October. The Anambas are 255 islands in a square of 100 x 100km. Multiple bays, anchorages, crystal clear water, coral and white beaches with almost no tourism. The other season she charters in the Mergui archipelago of Burma or in Phuket Langkawi.

hese islands in the South China Sea were first explored in 1825 by Hyacinthe de Bougainville with the corvette Thetis. He was the son of Louis Antoine de Bougainville, contemporary of James Cook, who is the first Frenchman to sail around the world in 1764 on the corvette La Boudeuse (the Sulky One). Hyacinthe later visited Sydney as related in the book 'The Governor's noble guest: Hyacinthe de Bougainville's account of Port Jackson, 1825 translated and edited by Marc Serge Riviere.' He was received by the governor Sir Thomas Brisbane.

As a young officer Hyacinthe de Bougainville was on the crew of the ship *Geographe* of the Nicolas Baudin expedition in 1800 - 1803 and he sailed the West Australian coast https://museum.wa.gov.au/fc/ (see aos/dj for an account of the expedition). The second ship of the expedition, the Naturaliste was captained by Jacques Hamelin who explored the Swan River. They made beautiful drawings. The expedition brought back kangaroos from Kangaroo Island were kangaroos were tame as they had never been hunted as well as black swans. In France the animals were given to Josephine, the wife of Napoleon. She kept them at her country house of Malmaison two hours south of Paris (you can visit the Chateau de la Malmaison). When Napoleon came to see his wife he was bored and was shooting the swans. Luckily, he was a very bad shot.

Bougainville was a colleague of lieutenant Thomas Vasse who drowned in the surf near the location of Busselton in 1801. The river Vasse is named after him.





SIR JAMES HARDY OBE A YACHTING GREAT HAS PASSED



bottom image: Sir James Hardy and Tony Manford. The friendship between Jim and Tony began in 1949 when they competed against each other as juniors in the Cadet Dinghy class in Adelaide for the Stonehaven Cup which was awarded to the winner of the Australian Championship. Tony won the event.

AUSTRALIA HAS LOST ONE of its yachting greats. Sir James Hardy OBE has passed away on the 15 June 2023.

Born in South Australia in 1932, he began working in the wine business for the famous Hardy's family brand name. He progressed through a variety of roles and eventually served as chairman of the family company that produced some of the nation's most popular wine brands. The company released a sparkling wine range in his honour in the late 1980s.

He will be better remembered by anyone that sails as having a sailing pedigree that stands out.

EARLY CAREER

In his early sailing career he:

• Won his first National Championship at the age of 16 in the Flying Dutchman Class.

• Was a reserve for the Tokyo 1964 Olympics

• Won the 505 Worlds in 1966 in Adelaide

• Competed in the Mexico 1984 Olympics

• Competed in four Admiral Cup Teams, winning with *Impetuous* in 1979

AMERICA'S CUP

In America's Cup history he was:Skipper of *Gretel II* in the 1970

America's Cup challenge

• Skipper of *Southern Cross* in the 1974 America's Cup challenge

• Skipper of *Australia* in the 1980 America's Cup challenge

• Reserve Helmsman for Australia II in the record breaking 1983 America's Cup win to Australia. His experience and expertise from previous campaigns was crucial to Australia II progressing through the Challenger Series with eight wins from nine races and on to challenge for the Cup itself.

ACHIEVEMENTS

He was awarded an OBE in 1975 and knighted in 1981 by Queen Elizabeth II for services to yachting and the community. In 1994 he was inducted to the America's Cup Hall of Fame and in 2000 he was awarded the Australian Sports Medal. In 2017 he was an inaugural inductee to the Australian Sailing Hall of Fame.

'Gentleman Jim' is and always will be one of the very best-known faces and names of Australian yachting.

He is survived by his wife Joan, brother David, sister Pamela, and sons David and Richard.

VALE HAROLD VERNON DURANT 1922 – 2023



He was one of five children born to Bob and Mary Durant. His early passion was for bicycle riding and he represented his school (Fremantle Christian Brothers College) in the 1935 State Schoolboys Championships. When his Aunt May bought him a special bike in1937 he won the Swansea State Consistency Trophy. His first job was for his brother's butcher shop in South Fremantle where on Saturday mornings he would load up a bicycle and deliver meat to seven local hotels. His father pressured him to stop racing, pointing out that Track racing was dangerous and an accident could jeopardise his brother's business. However, the offer of a job from Swansea Cycle and Motorbike

AROLD was born in Beaconsfield WA on 4 February 1922 and died 12 May 2023. A remarkable life, living to 101 years old.

Company in Fremantle enabled him to continue in competition.

World War II came around and on 4 November 1941 Harold enlisted and after initial training was posted to 5th Australian Independent Company which later became 5th Australian Commando Squadron. Harold's exploits with the Commandos against the Japanese in PNG were hair raising and included a mission on his 21st birthday in pouring rain when he and a comrade were tasked with silencing a Japanese machine gunner. It was while on leave that he married his first wife Bettye. He was discharged 24 January 1946.

On returning from the war Harold found the scene in Fremantle had changed. Whereas before the war the port was a huge employer and everyone rode bicycles to work, after the war no one was interested in racing and the fraternity dwindled. Bicycles were no longer the preferred means of transport. Despite this he managed the WA Professional Track Team for two years which included taking the team to Davenport in 1955. In the 1960s he resigned from Swansea and took on management of the BP service station and Avis agency opposite Shack Motors in Fremantle.

In 1983 he joined RFBYC and Chris Kelly sold him his S80 Yacht named *Ned Kelly* which enabled him to indulge his competitive spirit and love of the water. He subsequently sold this to a member of Princess Royal Sailing Club in Albany in order to purchase *Airborn*, a Sparkman and Stephens 36' in partnership with Bill Foster.

Bettye died in 1985 and he met Lynette Lovell in 1987 during the America's Cup Defence series. Lynn became a regular crew member on *Airborn*, particularly for twilight sailing at RFBYC and 'Cruising in Company' events. They married several years later.

Harold was a member of the Cottesloe sub branch of the RSL where he served as President, ably assisted by Lynn who was herself formerly a member of the Australian Army.

His life was one of achievement without fanfare!



VALE JOHN FRANCIS WALSH 1938 – 2023



John joined the Club in 1967 and was a member for 56 years. John was elected as a Special Member in 1987 a Life Member in 2016.

John was kind, generous, humble and humorous. He was a great raconteur and took delight in telling stories well into the night. This included reciting Banjo Paterson's 'The Man from Snowy River' from memory.

Courageous and skilled, with many talents, he sometimes referred to himself as being a bit of a bushy and was the last man to ride a horse across the Fremantle traffic bridge.

John loved many things during his colourful life, his wife Di and their family; Royal Freshwater Bay Yacht Club, sailing as well as ocean racing, he was a stalwart of the Farrawa crew. He loved the great Australian outdoors and was fond of shiraz and

single malt whiskey, to name but a few.

During his time at the Club he served as Honorary Treasurer and also provided expertise and input to numerous committees including General Committee, Sailing, Offshore, House and Membership.

He was a long-time volunteer and gave his time freely as a member of both river and offshore start teams and managed the Twilight Start Teams over numerous summer seasons.

In 1986 Commodore Baron-Hay asked John if he could organise a regatta and typically the reply was 'Yes. I can do that. What is it all about?' The task was running the largest yachting regatta in the history of Australia: The Louis Vuitton Cup to select the challenger to RPYC for the America's Cup. This involved some 14 nations competing against one another over a period of around three months. The 'Challenger of Record' was the Yacht Club Costa Smerelda based in Sardinia and whose Patron was the Aga Khan. It was a massive task involving many volunteers and boats and it all came together superbly.

He introduced the annual ANZAC Dawn Service to RFBYC with spectacular success and was an enthusiastic member of the St Ayles Skiff group. He participated in the build of the boats and towed Dotsie to a regatta in Geelong. He was a regular early morning rower.

A funeral service was held at St Columba's Catholic Church on Saturday 10 June, followed by a Celebration of Life at Royal Freshwater Bay Yacht Club in the Roland Smith Room.
